John M. Wilson Esquire who being duly sworn deposes & saith that on the 16th day of June 1833 Ruthy a mulatto woman the reputed wife of Thornton Blackburn was in the custody of the deponent, as sheriff of the County of Wayne in the said Territory, in the goal of the said County by virtue of a precept directed to the deponent by Henry Chipman Esquire a justice of the peace in & for the said County commanding the deponent to arrest the said Ruthy as a person held to labour in the state of Kentucky, & to deliver her to the agent of the claimant, in the said precept named, agreeably to the provisions of the act of the Legislative Council of the said Territory in such case made & provided: and that on the night of the said 11th day of June the said Ruthy broke & escaped from the said custody in the said goal & the deponent has reason to believe & verily does believe that the said Ruthy unlawfully conspired with some person or persons unknown to the deponent (of his own knowledge) to effect her escape.
